Board of Management's Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2022

The board members present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of the Charity for the year 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2022. The Board of Management confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Policies, Objectives and Activities

Cumbernauld YMCA recognises the Aims and Purposes of the International YMCA as exemplified through the global inverted "Red Triangle" that represents the core values of Body, Mind and Spirit in balance. As such our Association encourages its members to participate where possible in the national and International Family of the YMCA.

The Association adopted the following Mission and Vision Statements in August 2014.

MISSION

Committed to empowering children, young people and families in our communities.

VISION

Supporting our communities where everyone has the opportunity to achieve their potential.

CORE VALUES OF SERVICE

Integrity; Commitment; Empowerment; Compassion and Openness

Achievements and performance

Overview

Covid-19 effectively shut down our programme and services bar our supported accommodation for the whole year. Virtually our whole staff team had been furloughed for a year and it was to be another 6 months before we could get back to some kind of normality.

Our recovery plan had been developed but there was no respite from Covid-19 and any firm prospect yet of opening up the economy which was essential for our Children's Services to re-open. It would take till August 21 for us to fully re-open. Furlough was still in place and it would be phased out by December.

Meantime two key staff remained on full employment supported by our Executive Director (Children's Services); our Finance Manager (Payroll, etc.) and our Transport & Property Officer to ensure resident support and end keep maintenance schedules up-to-date till we could fully re-open up. Zoom became a key element of contact, training and support for staff and morale was consequently good.

Cash projections were stable and Core grant support continued so as the financial year end came along we remained in a secure position ready to take the necessary steps to prepare to re-open as soon as possible in the new year. Overall this has been a most challenging year for us all with a remarkable effort by the few to sustain the Association and its value to the communities we work in as society recovers from the effects of Covid-19.

Review of activities and programmes

Quality

The Association has maintained its support of quality Standards throughout this difficult time as evidenced by our own Quality Assessment review process, Charitable Status and Care Inspectorate requirements for childcare. Our Association also endeavours to meet Housing Support standards within the limited number of Supported Accommodation units retained for this valuable and necessary work in the interest of young people who find themselves homeless for whatever reason.

Board of Management's Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2022 (continued)

Strategic Review

New management structures, governance and further action to ensure sustainability had been reviewed but the impact of Covid-19 resulted in emergency measures which were hoped to be temporary. In effect the extra finance and governance load was taken up by the Chair whilst the Executive Director (Children's Services) took up the demands of keeping POMP out of school childcare ready and compliant with all the changing regulation and the required re-training and support for staff. Rather than a business plan we maintained an evolving strategy for coming out of lockdown complete with regular up-dates that took us through the whole year.

Children and Young People

The Children's Services department maintained its status as a very well recognised provider of Out of School Childcare. Revised SSSC standards in keeping with our peripatetic management model remained in focus but this required revision in the light of the new challenges. Staff training will be a clear focus as we move into the new year.

The Playzone outdoors space would be of more strategic value when we came out of lockdown and plans were in place to create a few shelters on site and a Portakabin to be installed next year.

Virtually all programmes have been deferred but our young residents received extra attention and assurance as they continue to cope with Covid restrictions.

Inter-agency work was partially maintained through face time and Zoom links. A new programme "Include & Aspire" has blended the two approaches between Bellshill & Mossend YMCA and ourselves which commenced shortly after Easter and ran to end of January 2022.

Families

POMP Out of School Childcare was 'on care and maintenance' but we retained furloughed employment over the year with some training opportunities made available towards the end of the year. Some contact was maintained to prepare for our return after lockdown.

Operations

Work in support of young homeless continued within 13 single person bedsits with resident contact and support maintained. The financial stability of this work remains a primary focus for the Association for the retention of our Supported Accommodation. The garden was on a care and maintenance basis in the circumstances with further developments on hold including changes to our courtyard to incorporate a café.

Cumbernauld YMCA is a Scottish living wage employer and plans to introduce a 35hr week in the coming year have understandably been on hold but will be re-assessed as part of our recovery plan. Our organisational resilience has held us in good stead and will be fully tested again in the coming year

Covid-19 impact

Thankfully, our Association had a positive cash balance of £40,792 and Net Assets of £18,049 at the year-end date.

Maintaining our staff was a major challenge but being furlough provided a great deal of confidence though the strain on our core management should not be under-estimated. The up-grade to our facilities and security to meet the new demands has been appreciated. Infection control systems have been introduced and ventilation is improved in preparation for the return to work. Challenges remain as we enter the new financial year, but we are much the wiser and have continued to learn from the experience. Protection arrangements limiting movement between zones, staff teams, children and young people they work with as safe as possible will continue. Infection controls will also be maintained along with facilities for self-testing.

Financial review

Going concern

Covid has had a significant impact on how the organisation activities are delivered. We are limited through registration numbers to have at least 2 staff in each base, but we also have to be able to cover illness, etc. We have attempted to mitigate this risk through our 'Cluster' arrangements so that 3 or 4 POMP bases operate and share staff. Worst case scenarios are to merge bases (temporary), close some or we will have to release staff.

Operating costs require close monitoring and quick response. By giving Cluster Managers greater responsibility to chase debt directly, then some issues about non-payment of fees will be mitigated.

Funding from grants is not expected to change much so the focus is on ensuring the organisation can operate, market and deliver services to young people efficiently at all levels.

After making appropriate enquiries, the Management have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

Review of results and reserves policy

The results for the year show overall that an income of £855,649 (2021 - £922,446), of which £nil related to restricted funds (2021 - £nil), and that a deficit of (£42,435) (2021 - surplus of £114,754, all of which related to unrestricted funds, has arisen. As a result of including the pension deficit liability to comply with the requirements of FRS102, the charity now has net assets of £18,049 (2021 - £60,210), all of which relates to unrestricted funds.

Recessionary pressures have continued to impact but are being managed effectively supporting the Association's stated position of maintaining financial sustainability in the longer term. Childcare fees have demonstrated remarkable resilience but are under pressure as the economy slowly recovers. Staff costs account for approximately 75% of total expenditure. Support provided by staff over the very difficult past year is much appreciated.

The Board of Management had established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets (the "free reserves") should be equivalent to at least 3 months payroll costs (currently £192,000) held in general funds. This has understandably not been achieved due to the inclusion of the pension deficit liability in the accounts. The Pension Liability is expected to continue until 2029 but the principle of free reserves continues as an operational target.

Investment's policy

The Board is mindful of its fiduciary duty to obtain the best possible financial return on any cash holdings consistent with exercising good practice in terms of social, environmental and ethical issues.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

Cumbernauld YMCA is a separately constituted unincorporated association that is affiliated directly to the Scottish National Council of YMCA's. The Association was first constituted on 1 November 1960 and has its head office at Kildrum Farm, Afton Road, Kildrum, Cumbernauld, G67 2DN. The amended constitution has been written in a modern form and became effective on 21 April 2009. It was designed to facilitate incorporation as a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO). The enabling Regulations came into effect from April 2011and Stage 1 SCIO approval is in place.

Methods of appointment or election of Board of Management

The management of the Charity is the responsibility of the board members who are elected and coopted under the terms of the Trust deed.

Organisational structure

The Association is controlled by its Board of Management consisting of 3 Office Bearers and up to 12 members.

Policies adopted for the induction and training of Board of Management

The charity has reviewed its policies relating to induction and training to comply with guidelines and recommendations from the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator. This has ensured that its policies are sufficient to meet the training needs of its directors and staff and that the charity continues to maintain the highest possible standards of service delivery. The primary elements of Board recruitment will be reviewed again in the light of planned restructuring relating to the Association's delayed incorporation intentions.

Pay policy for senior staff

The Association's salary scales were derived and extended from those used by the YMCA nationally back in 1980 and have been maintained locally ever since. Periodic checks are made against appropriate local authority scales to maintain a level of compatibility. They have been fully revised to incorporate the Scottish Living Wage.

The model is designed to recognise qualification levels required for post holders as well as progression leaving some scope for performance recognition. A guideline differential between front line staff and senior staff on maximum pay is maintained within a ratio of 1:5. The Scales to be implemented including any cost-of-living increase, have to be agreed annually with the Board of Management.

Structure, governance and management (continued)

Risk management

The Board of Management have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks. Forecasting systems have remained robust with a direct link into the main Sage accounting system enabling constant review of projections as circumstances change.

Covid-19 has represented a massive change in our operating environment over the year; this and other matters that did arise have been managed effectively.

Cumbernauld YMCA consider their key risks to be:

- 1. Maintaining financial sustainability especially in the light of volatility in childcare requirements in the short to medium term as employment returns to some normality. Mitigation accessing support funds to secure the immediate position and where practical merge bases (temporarily) and offer flexibility to help meet new challenges.
- 2. Core grant funding from our local authority is now down 60% in the past 5 years and down again for the coming year. Mitigation seek further grant opportunities but also market more effective the added value our service provides.
- 3. Recruitment of senior staff now critical to the well-being of the Association. Mitigation renewed advertising is necessary but cash projections are extremely challenging with focus currently on Children's Services delaying prospect of a new Executive staff member to later next year.
- 4. Finally achieving our SCIO Incorporation Pension Liability situation now appears to be secure.
- 5. Recovery from Covid-19 pandemic and its impact on the charity and its services.

Plans for future periods

Future plans and potential for development are a prime focus to be ready for recruitment of a new Executive Director.

Further development of our support services to young people having difficulty with engagement in school and learning opportunities through our new "Include & Aspire" programme promoted initially as a successful joint venture with Bellshill & Mossend YMCA.

The stated intention to incorporate as a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) can now be progressed to achieve Stage 2 final approval.

Statement of Board of Management's responsibilities

The Board of Management are responsible for preparing the Board of Management's report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In preparing these financial statements, the Board of Management are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP (FRS 102):
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in business.

The Board of Management are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the Charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and the provisions of the Trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Opinion

Notes to the financial statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2022

1. General information

The charity is a registered Scottish Charity (charity number SC014780). The registered office is Kildrum Farm, Afton Road, Cumbernauld, G67 2DN. The Board of Management are named on page 3 of these accounts.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of the financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102)-accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102 effective 01 January 2019), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

Cumbernauld YMCA meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

2.2 Going concern

The Board of Management ordinarily review the company's forecasts and projections to ensure that the charity has sufficient resources to enable it to meets its liabilities as they fall due for a period of at least twelve months from the date of signing the financial statements.

The Board of Management consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The charity has a healthy cash balance at the date of signing these financial statements, has had continued growth income throughout the Covid 19 pandemic to date, continued support from parents, access to government support and ability of the team to adapt and work remotely. Although the charity has decreased net assets due to the pension deficit, the cash impact of this can be managed and will not affect the long-term going concern of the charity. Both the cash balance and the net asset position have improved since last year end and the charity has ongoing support from their bank through an overdraft facility should it be required. Thus, the Board of Management are satisfied that the charity will have adequate resources to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

2.3 Income

All income is recognised once the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income receivable can be measured reliably. The recognition of income from legacies is dependent on establishing entitlement, the probability of receipt and the ability to estimate with sufficient accuracy the amount receivable. Evidence of entitlement to a legacy exists when the Charity has sufficient evidence that a gift has been left to them (through knowledge of the existence of a valid will and the death of the benefactor) and the executor is satisfied that the property in question will not be required to satisfy claims in the estate. Receipt of a legacy must be recognised when it is probable that it will be received and the fair value of the amount receivable, which will generally be the expected cash amount to be distributed to the Charity, can be reliably measured. Other income is recognised in the period it is receivable.

Notes to the Financial Statement for the Year Ended 31 March 2022 (continued)

2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure of raising funds includes all expenditure incurred by the Charity to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the Charity's objective, as well as any associated support and governance costs.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

2.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing £15,000 or more are capitalised and recognised when future economic benefits are probable, and the cost or value of the asset can be measured reliably.

Tangible fixed assets are initially recognised at cost. After recognition, under the cost model, tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. All costs incurred to bring a tangible fixed asset into its intended working condition should be included in the measurement of cost.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of the tangible fixed assets less their residual value over the estimated useful lives.

Depreciation is provided on the following bases:

Heritable properties 2% straight line
Motor vehicles 25% reducing balance
Fixture and Fittings 15% reducing balance

At the date of the transition to FRS 102 the Board of Management decided to adopt the valuation of property, plant and equipment as deemed cost.

2.6 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

2.7 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

2.8 Liabilities

Liabilities and provisions are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received in advanced payments for the goods and services it must provide.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised in the Statement of financial activities as a finance cost.

2.9 Financial instruments

The Charity only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at a transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised costs using the effective interest method.

2.10 Finance leases and hire purchase

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts and finance leases are capitalised as tangible fixed assets. Assets acquired by finance leases are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives. Assets acquired by hire purchase are depreciated over their useful lives. Finance leases are those where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership are assumed by the Charity. Obligations under such agreements are included in creditors, net of the finance charge allocated to future periods. The finance element of the rental payment is charged to the Statement of financial activities so as to produce a constant periodic rate of charge on the net obligations outstanding in each period.

2.11 Operating leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of financial activities on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

2.12 Pensions

The charity operates a defined benefits scheme and the last charge in the accounts was based on a full actuarial valuation dated 01 May 2020. There was no further valuation this year.

Cumbernauld YMCA participated in a multi-employer defined benefit pension plan for employees of YMCA's in England, Scotland and Wales, which was closed to new net members and accruals on 30 April 2017. Due to insufficient information, the plan's actuary has advised that it is not possible to separately identify the assets and liabilities relating to Cumbernauld YMCA for the purpose of FRS 102 disclosure.

As described in note 20 Cumbernauld YMCA has a contractual obligation to make provision deficit payments of £265,490 over the period to April 2029, accordingly this has been shown as a liability in these accounts. In addition, Cumbernauld YMCA is required to contribute around £7,000 p.a. to the operating expenses of the Pension Plan and these costs are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as made.

2.13 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for the use at the discretion of the Board of Management in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with the specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

3. Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

The Charity makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

Critical areas of judgement:

Pension Liability:

The charity participates in a multi-employer defined benefits pension scheme. The determination of any pension scheme deficit is based on assumptions determined with independent actuarial advice.

18. Pension commitments

Cumbernauld YMCA participated in a contributory pension plan providing defined benefits based on final pensionable pay for employees of YMCAs in England, Scotland and Wales. The assets of the YMCA Pension Plan are held separately from those of Cumbernauld YMCA and at the year end these were invested in the Mercer Dynamic De-Risking Solution, 40% matching portfolio and 60% in the growth portfolio and Schroder (property units only).

The most recent completed three-year valuation was as at 1 May 2020. The assumptions used which have the most significant effect on the results of the valuation are those relating to the assumed rates of return on assets held before and after retirement of 2.59% and 1.09% respectively, the increase in pensions in payment of 2.99% (for RPI capped at 5% p.a.), and the average life expectancy from normal retirement age (of 65) for a current male pensioner of 22.0 years, female 24.4 years, and 23.7 years for a male pensioner, female 26.1 years, retiring in 20 years' time. The result of the valuation showed that the actuarial value of the assets was £146.1m, which represented 79% of the benefits that had accrued to members.

The Pension Plan was closed to new members and future service accrual with effect from 30 April 2007. With the removal of the salary linkage for benefits all employed deferred members became deferred members as from 1 May 2011.

The valuation prepared as at 1 May 2020 showed that the YMCA Pension Plan had a deficit of £36 million. Cumbernauld YMCA has been advised that it will need to make monthly contributions of £2,649 (plus expenses) from 1 May 2020. This amount is based on the current actuarial assumptions (as outlined above) and may vary in the future as a result of actual performance of the Pension Plan. The current recovery period is 9 years commencing 1st May 2020.

In addition, Cumbernauld YMCA may have over time liabilities in the event of the non-payment by other participating YMCAs of their share of the YMCA Pension Plan's deficit. It is not possible currently to quantify the potential amount that Cumbernauld YMCA may be called upon to pay in the future.

Contingent liabilities

Following a change in legislation in September 2005, there is a potential debt on the employer that could be levied by the Trustee of the Pension Plan. The debt is due in the event of the employer ceasing to participate in the Pension Plan or the Pension Plan winding up. The debt for the Pension Plan as a whole is calculated by comparing the liabilities for the Pension Plan (calculated on a buy-out basis). If the liabilities exceed assets there is a buy-out debt. Cumbernauld YMCA does not intend to withdraw from the Pension Plan and the Trustee has confirmed that there is no intention to wind up the Pension Plan. The debt on withdrawal is estimated at £674,696 at 1 May 2020.

20. Post balance sheet events

Since March 2022 and continuing until the date of signing of these financial statements and beyond, the UK and the world has faced unprecedented uncertainty and disruption as a result of COVID-19.
